

YOUR RESPONSIBILITY CODE At Snowshoe Mountain, you may see people using alpine, snowboard, telemark and other specialized equipment such as that used by disabled or other skiers and snowboarders. Regardless of how you decide to enjoy the slopes, always show courtesy to others and be aware that there are elements of risk in this sport that common sense and personal awareness can help reduce. Observe the code listed in the following section and share with others the responsibility for a great skiing and snowboarding experience at Snowshoe Mountain.

- 1. Always stay in control, and be able to stop or avoid other people
- 2. People ahead of you have the right of way. It is your responsibility to avoid them.
- 3. You must not stop where you obstruct a trail, or are not visible
- 4. Whenever starting downhill or merging into a trail, look uphill and yield to others.

- 5. Always use devices to help prevent runaway equipment.
- 6. Observe all posted signs and warnings. Keep off closed trails and out
- 7. Prior to using any lift, you must have the knowledge and ability to load, ride and unload safely.

This is a partial list. Be safety conscious. Officially endorsed by the NATIONAL SKI AREA ASSOCIATION.

FREESTYLE TERRAIN SAFETY

Make a plan, Look before you leap, easy style it, respect gets respect. Snowshoe Mountain has six areas of freestyle terrain, totaling 26 acres. Prior to entering freestyle terrain, please familiarize yourself with the following guidelines:

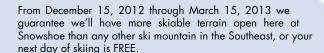
1. Read all warning signs at top of park carefully.

- 2. Inspect entire park before attempting any features.
- 3. Ride within your ability at all times. Do not attempt features unless you have sufficient ability and experience to do so safely.
- 4. Do not stop or stand on top of features or in landing areas.
- 5. Always use a spotter.

IN CASE OF ACCIDENTS

- Place skis / snowboards upright and crossed in the snow above the scene of the accident.
- Reach the Ski Patrol directly by contacting a lift attendant or other area personnel.
- When reporting an accident, be sure to give the exact trail location and type of injury. The numbers posted on snowmaking hydrants are a good indicator of your lo cation.

GLADED TERRAIN

Gladed terrain is for advanced and expert skiers and snowboarders only. Gladed-terrain trails are largely left in their natural state. They are ungroomed and contain unmarked hazards, including, but not limited to, trees (standing and fallen), branches, roots, streams, stumps, rocks, and forest debris. By skiing or snowboarding on gladed-terrain trails, you are assuming the risk of serious personal injuries or death, as well as damage to equipment. Given the hazards and risks presented by gladed-terrain trails, as well as the remoteness of the terrain, skiers and snowboarders entering gladed-terrain trails should not do so alone. You are encouraged to enter such trails in groups of three or more.

MOUNTAIN STATS

- 244 acres of groomed terrain comprised of 57 trails
- 7 Acres of Gladed Terrain
- 15 Lifts
- 4.848' Summit Elevation
- 1,500' Vertical Drop
- 6 Freestyle areas totalling 26 acres

Skiers and snowboarders should be advised that a green circle, blue square or black diamond trail at Snowshoe Mountain is not necessarily the same as a similarly rated trail at another area. Skiers and snowboarders should work their way up, beginning with the easiest trails no matter what their ability level may be, until they are familiar with the trails at Snowshoe Mountain.
